The 2020 Census is hiring thousands

The Census Bureau is working to fill thousands of positions nationwide in order to update this address list. As of March 4, more than 170,000 recruits had already completed job applications to qualify for temporary census jobs and more than 800 had been hired.

More will be hired through the year for jobs in the spring and summer of 2020. That's when census workers knock on doors to interview people who don't respond to the census.

Applicants can qualify for both field and office positions. The office positions, which are more limited, will be located in area census offices. The role of these offices is to recruit, select, hire, train, manage, and pay all office and field staff who work within the designated boundaries of the geographic territory assigned to the office.

Applying for one of these jobs is simple. Just visit <u>2020census/jobs</u> or call 855-JOB-2020 and select option 3 for more information. Pay rates for field and clerical jobs can be found at: <u>2020census.gov/jobs/pay-and-locations/national-map</u>.

Those who are being considered for a position will receive a telephone interview. If offered a job, they will receive instructions on next steps via email.

Applicants will need to complete paperwork online and make an appointment to get fingerprinted for the background check. Once they are offered the job, there will be a period of time before their start date to allow time for the background clearance process. To search for possible management positions, go to USAjobs.gov.

If applicants are not selected for the Address Canvassing operation, they may be called later if positions open later in 2020. Their applications will remain on file.

PATHWAY AND DMS KICK OFF 2020 WITH A HIRING EVENT

Pathway has continued to establish and strengthen relationships with employer partners in an effort to assist job seekers with obtaining living wage jobs. After having received hundreds of work ready candidates through the efforts of the PAID program, employer partner Detroit Manufacturing Systems (DMS) continues to reach out to the PAID program to fill vacancies for full time positions at its Toledo production facility near Jeep Parkway.

On February 11th 2020, the PAID program hosted DMS for another full day onboarding new hire orientation. Approximately 20 candidates, most graduates of the PAID program, completed their on boarding documents and were introduced to a variety of DMS personnel. Union officials conducted their private question and answer presentations. Representatives from the benefits carrier, conducted a question and answer presentation and collected documents from the new hires. Sister's United, A Motherhood Program - debuts for Pathway in 2020

More than four years ago, Pathway Inc. introduced its Brothers United Program and, during that time, 1,614 fathers – the parents of 4,592 children in Lucas County – have participated in the program receiving direction and assistance on co-parenting issues, child support and developing job skills.

"Nearly five years of a national program and we are seeing some phenomenal results," said Pathway CEO Cheryl Grice on Thursday January 9 as the agency introduced the logical extension to its Brothers United program – Sisters United.

Avis Files, director of Family and Supportive Services for Pathway and leader of the Brothers United program, explained the concept of the Sisters United program to a gathering at Mott Branch Library that included members of a variety of organizations and community action agencies in the area such as — Lucas Metropolitan Housing Authority, Harbor Behavioral, Toledo Public Schools, Toledo Community Foundation, Lucas County Children Services, and others.

The concept for Sisters United, said Files, was borne out of the Brothers United program and persistent input from that program's participants that more members of the community would benefit from such insight.

"This is cool, this is good," she recalled more than one such participant telling her over the years of the program. "But my co-parent – you got to help her." Prompted by such suggestions, Files and Pathway started Sisters United – even the name was proposed by the BU men.

Now, Sisters United will open with a pilot program, funded by the Toledo Community Foundation's William R. Winkle Memorial Foundation; that will enable 20 women – mothers – to benefit from the same types of information their male counterparts have been receiving. In the case of the women participants, the focus will be on improving motherhood skills and co-parenting.

The program includes eight days of motherhood skills and then two weeks of "soft skills," said Files, designed to improve work skills.

Toledo Community Foundation – www.toledocf.org – has funded the program for the first year until June 2020.

As a preliminary test, Pathway recruited five mothers from LMHA's Birmingham Terrace to participate in a test program. Those five finished the program last October and from that initial experiment came the formula for the future Sister United program and even the theme: "We Are Mothers United as Sisters!" 
